The Principal must be made aware of any results ASAP</p> <p>Self-isolate immediately if: someone has any symptoms of coronavirus (a high temperature, a new, continuous cough or a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste). They have tested positive for coronavirus – this means they have coronavirus. They live with someone who has symptoms or has tested positive. Someone in their support bubble has symptoms or has tested positive. They are told by NHS Test and Trace that they have been in contact with a person with coronavirus.</p> <p>Staff members and parents/carers understand that they will need to be ready and willing to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • book a test if they are displaying symptoms. Staff and pupils must not come into the school if they have symptoms, and must be sent home to self-isolate if they develop them in school. • provide details of anyone they have been in close contact with if they were to test positive for coronavirus (COVID-19) or if asked by NHS Test and Trace • self-isolate if they have been in close contact with someone who develops coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms or someone who tests positive for coronavirus (COVID-19) <p>Anyone who displays symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) can and should get a test. Tests can be booked online through the NHS testing and tracing for coronavirus website, or ordered by telephone via NHS 119 for those without access to the internet. Essential workers, which includes anyone involved in education or childcare, have priority access to testing.</p> <p>Parents and staff will be asked to inform school immediately of the results of a test:</p>	<p>Yes</p>	<p>Low</p>

			<p>Main messages</p> <p>If you have symptoms of COVID-19 however mild, you must self-isolate for at least 10 days from when your symptoms started. You should arrange to have a test to see if you have COVID-19 – go to testing to arrange. Do not go to a GP surgery, pharmacy or hospital.</p> <p>If you are not experiencing symptoms but have tested positive for COVID-19 you also must self-isolate for at least 10 days, starting from the day the test was taken. If you develop symptoms during this isolation period, you must restart your 10-day isolation from the day you develop symptoms.</p> <p>After 10 days, if you still have a temperature you should continue to self-isolate and seek medical advice. You do not need to self-isolate after 10 days if you only have a cough or loss of sense of smell or taste, as these symptoms can last for several weeks after the infection has gone.</p> <p>If you live with others, all other household members must stay at home and not leave the house for 14 days. The 14-day period starts from the day when the first person in the household became ill or if they do not have symptoms, from the day their test was taken. If anyone else in the household starts displaying symptoms, they must stay at home for at least 10 days from when their symptoms appear, regardless of what day they are on in their original 14-day isolation period. The ending isolation section below has more information.</p> <p>Ending self-isolation</p> <p>If you have had symptoms of COVID-19 or a positive test, then you may end your self-isolation after 10 days and return to your normal routine if you do not have symptoms other than cough or loss of sense of smell or taste.</p> <p>Negative test result</p> <p>A negative result means the test did not find coronavirus.</p> <p>You do not need to self-isolate if your test is negative, as long as:</p> <p>Everyone you live with who has symptoms tests negative. Everyone in your support bubble who has symptoms tests negative. You were not told to self-isolate</p>	
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				<p>for 14 days by NHS Test and Trace. You feel well – if you feel unwell, stay at home until you’re feeling better. If you have diarrhoea or you’re being sick, stay at home until 48 hours after they’ve stopped.</p> <p>If someone tests negative, if they feel well and no longer have symptoms similar to coronavirus (COVID-19), they can stop self-isolating. They could still have another virus, such as a cold or flu – in which case it is still best to avoid contact with other people until they are better. Other members of their household can stop self-isolating.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • If someone tests positive, they should follow the ‘stay at home: guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19) infection’ and must continue to self-isolate for at least 10 days from the onset of their symptoms and then return to school only if they do not have symptoms other than cough or loss of sense of smell/taste. This is because a cough or anosmia can last for several weeks once the infection has gone. The 7-day period starts from the day when they first became ill. If they still have a high temperature, they should keep self-isolating until their temperature returns to normal. Other members of their household should continue self-isolating for the full 14 days. <p>If a student is awaiting collection (due to becoming unwell with Covid 19 symptoms), they should be isolated immediately to the welfare officers room in reception, the door can be closed, they can be isolated and the windows can be opened for ventilation. Where appropriate adult supervision if required can be in place (door will remain open and staff to wear full PPE). If it is not possible to isolate them, move them to an area which is at least 2 metres away from other people. The room will be deep cleaned immediately after they have left.</p> <p>If they need to go to the bathroom while waiting to be collected, after the student has finished the bathroom will be deep cleaned immediately.</p> <p>PPE should be worn by staff supporting the student while they await collection if a distance of 2 metres cannot be maintained (such as for a student in distress).</p> <p>In an emergency, follow normal protocols and call 999 if they are seriously ill or injured or their life is at risk. Do not visit the GP, pharmacy, walk in centre or a hospital.</p> <p>If a member of staff has helped someone who was unwell with a new, continuous</p>		
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				<p>cough, a high temperature or they have a loss of taste or smell, they do not need to go home unless they develop symptoms themselves (and in which case, a test is available) or the student subsequently tests positive.</p> <p>They should wash their hands thoroughly for 20 seconds after any contact with someone who is unwell. Cleaning the affected area with disinfectant after someone with symptoms has left will reduce the risk of passing the infection on to other people.</p>

Their fellow household members should self-isolate for 14 days. All staff and students who are attending an education setting will have access to a test if they display symptoms of coronavirus, and are encouraged to get tested in this scenario. School can support and guide them through this process. School will contact the local health protection team and immediately email SPOC. This team will also contact school directly if they become aware that someone who has tested positive for coronavirus (COVID-19) attended the school – as identified by NHS Test and Trace. The health protection team will work with schools in this situation to guide them through the actions they need to take. Based on the advice from the health protection team, schools must send home those people who have been in close contact with the person who has tested positive, advising them to self-isolate for 14 days since they were last in close contact with that person when they were infectious. The health protection team will provide definitive advice on who must be sent home.</p> <p>If someone in a class or group that has been asked to self-isolate develops symptoms themselves within their 14-day isolation period, they should follow 'stay at home: guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19) infection'. They should get a test, and:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • if the test delivers a negative result, they must remain in isolation for the remainder of the 14-day isolation period. This is because they could still develop the coronavirus (COVID-19) within the remaining days. • if the test result is positive, they should inform their setting immediately, and must isolate for at least 10 days from the onset of their symptoms (which could mean the self-isolation ends before or after the original 14-day isolation period). Their household should self-isolate for at least 14 days from when the symptomatic person first had symptoms, following 'stay at home: guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19) infection' <p>Where the student or staff member tests positive, we will follow guidance from the LA and government on self-isolation, follow track and trace guidance and testing for staff and students.</p>	No	Low

				<p>Any confirmed cases will be reported to the governing body, the local authority, the DfE and Public Health England as necessary.</p> <p>Local outbreaks Schools and colleges will contact their local health protection team if they: have 2 or more confirmed cases of coronavirus (COVID-19) among pupils or staff within 14 days see an increase in children or staff absence rates due to suspected or confirmed cases of coronavirus (COVID-19)</p> <p>The local health protection team will advise what action is required. Usually, closure will not be necessary, but some groups may need to self-isolate. If an outbreak in a school or college is confirmed, a mobile testing unit may be dispatched. They will test everyone who may have been in contact with the person who has tested positive. Testing will first focus on the person's class, followed by their year group, then the whole school or college, if necessary.
