 Rapid coronavirus (COVID-19) testing in secondary schools and colleges Rapid testing will be provided by the DfE for the school and college workforce to conduct weekly testing - this will help identify those who are carrying the virus without displaying symptoms, reducing the risk of transmission for students and pupils as well as the school and college workforce to conduct daily testing for those identified as close contacts of workforce colleagues, students or pupils that have tested positive - this ensures that they do not need to isolate and are able to continue to benefit from high quality, face to face education For every group, testing is voluntary, but those who are eligible for tests are strongly encouraged to participate to reduce the risk of transmission within schools and colleges. Rapid testing helps identify those asymptomatic cases that might otherwise not be detected, causing the virus to spread further. Main messages
If you have symptoms of COVID-19 however mild, you must self-isolate for at least 10 days from when your symptoms started. You should arrange to have a test to see if you have COVID-19 – go to testing to arrange. Do not go to a GP surgery, pharmacy or hospital.
If you are not experiencing symptoms but have tested positive for COVID-19 you also must self-isolate for at least 10 days, starting from the day the test was taken. If you develop symptoms during this isolation period, you must restart your 10-day isolation from the day you develop symptoms.
After 10 days, if you still have a temperature you should continue to self-isolate and seek medical advice. You do not need to self-isolate after 10 days if you only have a cough or loss of sense of smell or taste, as these symptoms can last for several weeks after the infection has gone.
A change to the self-isolation period from 14 to 10 days has been announced.
On Monday 14 December, the change to the isolation period for contacts will apply to all those who are currently self-isolating including those who commenced self-isolation before Monday.
Self-isolation is essential to reducing the spread of COVID as it breaks the chains of transmission. After reviewing the evidence, we are now confident that we can reduce the number of days that contacts self-isolate from 14 days to 10 days.
People who return from countries which are not on the travel corridor list should also self-isolate for 10 days instead of 14 days.
People who test positive should continue to self-isolate for 10 days from onset of symptoms or 10 days from point of taking a positive test if asymptomatic.

Ending self-isolation

If you have had symptoms of COVID-19 or a positive test, then you may end your self-isolation after 10 days and return to your normal routine if you do not have symptoms other than cough or loss of sense of smell or taste. Negative test result A negative result means the test did not find coronavirus. You do not need to self-isolate if your test is negative, as long as: Everyone you live with who has symptoms tests negative. Everyone in your support bubble who has symptoms tests negative. You were not told to self-isolate for 10 days by NHS Test and Trace. You feel well - if you feel unwell, stay at home until you're feeling better. If you have diarrhoea or you're being sick, stay at home until 48 hours after they've stopped. If someone tests negative, if they feel well and no longer have symptoms similar to coronavirus (COVID-19), they can stop self-isolating. They could still have another virus, such as a cold or flu - in which case it is still best to avoid contact with other people until they are better. Other members of their household can stop selfisolating. If someone tests positive, they should follow the 'stay at home: guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19) infection' and must continue to self-isolate for at least 10 days from the onset of their symptoms and then return to school only if they do not have symptoms other than cough or loss of sense of smell/taste. This is because a cough or anosmia can last for several weeks once the infection has gone. The 7-day period starts from the day when they first became ill. If they still have a high temperature, they should keep self-isolating until their temperature returns to normal. Other members of their household should continue self-isolating for the full 10 days. If a student is awaiting collection (due to becoming unwell with Covid 19 symptoms), they should be isolated immediately to the welfare officers room in reception, the door can be closed, they can be isolated and the windows can be opened for ventilation. Where appropriate adult supervision if required can be in place (door will remain open and staff to wear full PPE). If it is not possible to isolate them, move them to an area which is at least 2 metres away from other people. The room will be deep cleaned immediately after they have left. If they need to go to the bathroom while waiting to be collected, after the student has finished the bathroom will be deep cleaned immediately.

PPE should be worn by staff supporting the student while they await collection if a distance of 2 metres cannot be maintained (such as for a student in distress). In an emergency, follow normal protocols and call 999 if they are seriously ill or
injured or their life is at risk. Do not visit the GP, pharmacy, walk in centre or a hospital. If a member of staff has helped someone who was unwell with a new, continuous
cough, a high temperature or they have a loss of taste or smell, they do not need to go home unless they develop symptoms themselves (and in which case, a test is available) or the student subsequently tests positive.
They should wash their hands thoroughly for 20 seconds after any contact with someone who is unwell. Cleaning the affected area with disinfectant after someone with symptoms has left will reduce the risk of passing the infection on to other people.
NHS QR registered and created for the school reception area. Visitors to Harmonize Academy to scan the QR code when they arrive, using the NHS COVID-19 app. This is to help trace and stop the spread of coronavirus (COVID- 19). An app user is able to check in at school by scanning the QR code using the NHS COVID-19 App. When they check in, the venue name, date and time is shown to
the user so they can verify the details (and cancel if necessary). The venue name, unique poster ID, date and time are stored on their device for up to 21 days, and this list is visible to the user. If any visitors do not have a smartphone or use the NHS Covid 19 app then the admin team will take the personal details of any visitors manually and keep them for 21 days.

Any confirmed cases will be reported to the governing body, the local authority, the DfE and Public Heath England as necessary. Local outbreaks Schools and colleges will contact their local health protection team if they: have 2 or more confirmed cases of coronavirus (COVID-19) among pupils or staff within 14 days see an increase in children or staff absence rates due to suspected or confirmed cases of coronavirus (COVID-19)
The local health protection team will advise what action is required. Usually, closure will not be necessary, but some groups may need to self-isolate. If an outbreak in a school or college is confirmed, a mobile testing unit may be dispatched. They will test everyone who may have been in contact with the person who has tested positive. Testing will first focus on the person's class, followed by their year group, then the whole school or college, if necessary. whilst in school, to ensure all staff are able to participate in and have access to appropriate supervision. Staff rota's are in place for delivering face to face learning for vulnerable students and students of critical workers. Staff workload, responsibilities at home and staff
who are classed as clinically vulnerable or clinically extremely vulnerable has all been considered. Canteen staff will provide staff and students with breakfast and lunch. Food will be
served from the servery area and students will collect breakfast and lunch one at a time, socially distanced. Students can sit and eat lunch in the canteen but must adhere to social distancing measures at all times. Movement will be restricted around the building as we want to limit the movement
of students, access will be made available to a classroom, dining room and the toilets are all accessible. We are only using one corner of the building which allows for cleaning and fogging of the building to be more concentrated. Cleaners will be in immediately after staff and students leave and cleaning will be
meticulous. The school building will be fogged each day after all students and staff leave. Particular attention will be made for touch points and high traffic areas. The students that attend will be in a mixed bubble but will be as restricted as
possible. All students will be able to maintain social distancing.
